May is the month of National Poppy Day. I would like to share some information about the Poppy Program from the National website: ALA Poppy Program

Connecting the visual image of the poppy with the sacrifice made by our veterans has been an important goal of the American Legion Auxiliary Poppy Program since its inception in 1921. On Memorial Day and Veterans Day, millions of red crepe paper poppies—all handmade by veterans as part of their therapeutic rehabilitation—are distributed across the country in exchange for donations that go directly to assist disabled and hospitalized veterans in our communities.

The Poppy

After World War I, the poppy flourished in Europe. Scientists attributed this to soils in France and Belgium becoming enriched with lime from the rubble left by the war. From the dirt and mud grew beautiful red poppies. The red poppy came to symbolize the blood shed during battle following the publication of the wartime poem "In Flanders Fields." The poem was written by Lieutenant Colonel John McCrae, M.D. while serving on the front lines.

On September 27, 1920, the poppy became the official flower of the American Legion family to memorialize the soldiers who fought and died during the war. In 1924, the distribution of poppies became a national program of the American Legion.

Led by the American Legion Auxiliary, each year members of the American Legion family distribute poppies with a request that the person receiving the flower makes a donation to support the future of veterans, active-duty military personnel and their families with medical and financial needs.

Poppy Distribution

Millions of American Legion Auxiliary poppies are distributed annually by ALA unit members, raising money for veterans, active-duty service members and their families. Children are involved in spreading the poppy message also. Poppy Poster Contests are held in local schools for students in grades 2 to 12. The Little Miss Poppy Contest is a fun event for Junior Auxiliary members ages 6-12 who promote the Auxiliary memorial poppy.

Meeting the continuing needs of our veterans should be the concern of every American who values his or her freedom. The ALA promotes the poppy as a symbol of the sacrifices our military has made, a symbol to open people's hearts and inspire them to donate.

National Poppy Day

Poppy Day is celebrated in countries around the world. The American Legion brought National Poppy Day to the United States by asking Congress to designate the Friday before Memorial Day as National Poppy Day.

On the Friday before Memorial Day, please wear a red poppy to honor the fallen heroes and support the living who have worn our nation's uniform.

Jo Ann Cronin
April 7, 1953 - December 14, 2020

Jo Ann Cronin of Imperial died in Kansas City on December 14, 2020 from complications with Alzheimer's. She was a loving daughter, sister, aunt and community leader. She enthusiastically and selflessly gave her time to her community on a local and national level. Her kindness and commitment to family, friends and community will certainly be missed.

Jo Ann was a lifetime member of the American Legion Auxiliary Unit 283, District 13. She was elected the Missouri Department President in 1990-1991. Cronin received many National Committee appointments. In 2001 she had the honor of being the National Convention Chairman when the convention was held in St. Louis. Her big challenge was being elected National President in

2006-2007. During this tenure, she focused on creative arts, raising over \$100,000 for the National Creative Arts Festival. As the official representative of the American Legion Auxiliary, she visited local units and met dignitaries across the United States, territories, Europe and Asia. Jo Ann remained an active member of the ALA following her presidency, initiating the Strategic Planning Committee for the National ALA, and was instrumental in the establishment of the American Legion Auxiliary Foundation.

Her support for Missouri Girls State was recognized in 2015 by having a city named in her honor.

Jo Ann graduated from St. Pius X High School, completed a bachelor's degree in mathematics from Notre Dame College and a master's degree in computer science from University of Missouri-St. Louis. She was a member of St. Joseph Catholic Church, served on the finance committee and taught RCIA. Jo Ann worked for over 30 years at the Department of Defense, serving on numerous special projects and holding several leadership positions. She is survived by her mother,

Adeline Cronin; brother, Gary (Karen); brother-in-law, Bob Hardin; several nieces, nephews and all their families. She is preceded in death by her father, Jack M. Cronin, and sister, Patti Harden, deceased since her passing.

The American Legion Auxiliary Missouri Girls State Committee and Staff are hard at work preparing a limited, in-person session for 2021 to be held on the campus of the University of Central Missouri from June 20-26. Although we had to cancel our session in 2020, we have created protocols for how to address the health and safety of all of our ALA MGS citizens and staff, including mandatory mask-wearing, daily health assessments and the use of single-person dorm rooms to accommodate our much smaller program population. Many of our other events, locations or plans will also have slight modifications due to changes with the university or as a result of the COVID-19 pandemic.

We want to thank all of the ALA Units who have continued to prioritize and find a way to sponsor a delegate to this year's session. We know we could not do this without your support, and we understand the hardships all of our Units and communities have faced during this past year. However, we can all attest to the value of our program and what it can do to inspire our youth to participate in our democratic society at the local, state and national level.

Among the changes that we have planned for this year's session, we will not be allowing outside visitors to the session outside of arranged speakers. This includes hosting our annual Alumni and Friends event that we have previously held on the Thursday of our ALA Girls State session. While we know there is no way to replace the experience of coming to visit our session in person, we are hoping that you may consider donating an item to ALA MGS that we feel will be necessary to conduct our session this year. These items include thermometers for temperature checks, detergent to launder fabric masks, disinfecting wipes and hand soap (to provide to all participants). Therefore, we will contact your Unit Chair or President if your delegate does not meet this requirement.

The members wanted to encourage young children to begin reading at an early age. Our conversations were constructive and provided many ideas toward accomplishing this effort. The auxiliary began collecting books from friends, neighbors and other sources to put into this library.

We were able to enlist the help of a young man who needed a project in order to obtain his Boy Scout "Eagle Badge." He was so wonderful and took great pride in accepting our invitation to build the library. He had to design, get site approval from Valley Park City Hall, submit all his drawings to the Boy Scout board and wait for final acceptance. Approval for all of this planning took many weeks. The unit happily approved the submitted drawings.

The young scout had excellent support from his family. They built the library in the family garage over several months. They decided to paint the library "red" to match the cute "red" caboose that is parked in downtown Valley Park.

This is an excellent way to promote a sense of community and understanding to have a super project like the "Little Library." There is a website where anyone can see these libraries in various communities. Some are even used for health resources like shampoo, band-aids, socks, etc.

When COVID allows, our unit will have a dedication for the community. The plaque on the front has the unit's name under the front door and the Eagle Scout's name. Our aim is to stock gently used books for ages 3 years to grade 6. We encourage RHYME books, NURSERY RHYME books, FAIRY TALE books and books on lives of our HEROES, SCIENCE, MUSIC and ARTS. A small sign says, "Bring One, Take One."

The last line on the sign emphasizes our dearest dream, which is, "EACH ONE! TEACH ONE!"

Leglative Report

The American Legion Auxiliary is an associate member of the Missouri Association of Veteran Organizations (MAVO). As a chairman I attended those meetings and research bills that may affect veterans and/or military. There is a serious situation concerning the funding of our Veterans Homes and Cemeteries. The homes and cemeteries fall under Missouri Veterans Commission (MVC), which receives funding from gaming boats. This funding stream has been decreasing by approximately 15% each year, not to mention the gaming boats were closed due to the COVID-19 pandemic. The other source of funding for the MVC was to come from the Medical Marijuana revenue to the Missouri Veterans' Health and Care Fund. So far they have not received a lot of money from this fund, and there are other factions that would like to get a "piece of the pie." I am asking you to contact your state congressional members and ask them to make sure our homes and cemeteries will continue to be funded. This would include sources from general revenue to make up for the fiscal shortfalls.

MAVO — Missouri Association of Veterans Organizations

LEGISLATIVE AGENDA 2021

- (Priority) As revenues from gaming continue to decline, it is imperative for the state to ensure veterans commission funding remains a top priority through maintenance of existing revenue sources with inclusion of general revenue to make up for fiscal shortfalls. Maintain the necessary level of funding for the operation and maintenance of State Veterans Homes, State Veterans Cemeteries, Veterans Service Officers Program, Veterans Grant Program and other needs of Missouri veterans. MVC is funded by three major sources: Dept of Veteran Affairs and Missouri Gaming Commission and the Missouri Veterans Health and Care Fund.

- Advocate to maximize allocation of funds from the MO Veterans Health and Care Fund (medical marijuana) to the Missouri Veterans Commission, and emphasize MVC funding on any future recreational marijuana legislation.

- Maintain the 9-person Missouri Veterans Commission with 1 Ex-Officio member from the MMPEC AS STATED IN Chapter 42 RsMO and maintain the governance of Missouri Veterans Commission as stated in Chapter 42 RsMO with NO MERGER WITH ANY OTHER ENTITY; MVC shall remain under the Department of Public Safety.

- Advocate for additional veterans service officers to help ensure Missouri's veterans receive the benefits they have earned and, given that the state's economy receives an influx of \$156 for every dollar spent on a veterans service officer, that Missouri enjoys the healthiest economy possible.

- Implement plans to introduce Adult Day Health Care in our state veteran homes.

- Support Veterans Treatment Courts Statewide.

- Support implementation of new VA home model in ALL HOMES of our state veterans homes to include construction of private rooms and restrooms for our veterans.

- Support the creation of a state-wide Prescription Drug Monitoring program.

- Support the concept of the "Missouri Veterans' Heritage Protection Act" to protect memorials of historic military significance in Missouri.

- Support any other legislation introduced in the legislature determined by the MAVO Legislative Committee to be in the interest of veterans.

ENDORSEMENT DEPARTMENT PRESIDENT VICTORIA ORNELAS





III. Appearance (10 scoring points) _____points

1. Please use a blue binder or blue soft cover binder preferably with an Auxiliary seal decal on the front. The regulation binder with imprinted seal sold by emblem sales is also acceptable.
2. Text: Use 12 point font, Times New Roman or Arial style font
3. Paragraphs: may be indented or in block form.
4. Spacing
 - a. The introduction section is single-spaced. The Unit/District information and the other content is double-spaced
5. Page setup
 - a. The introduction section is centered on the page.
 - b. The remaining material should have consistent margins throughout.
 - c. Page numbers are only on the narrative of your History.
 - d. Index is optional and is to be placed in the back of the book.

IV. Content (70 scoring points) _____points

The ALA Missouri Unit/District annual history shall be written as a factual narrative beginning with the Installation of Officers for the current year and ending with the summary of end of year reports and closing events for this year.

1. The History shall be written in third person.
2. Use clear, concise language with correct spelling.
3. Do not include computer graphics, pen and ink drawings, illustrations, extra material, newspaper clippings or other embellishments.
4. You may include pictures placed in your History section only. This is optional. You are not required to use them or penalized for not using them. They should be used only to help tell the story of your Unit/District.
5. Make sure that the History tells the story of your Unit/District. It is not about one person. It is about what your Unit/District has done this year.
6. The typed name/title and written signature of the Unit/District Historian should immediately follow the final paragraph of the history.

NOTE: It has been suggested by National History Committee to make one History book that will include 2019-2020 and 2020-2021. Another suggestion is to divide the book into two chapters. Information that might be included as part of the Unit/District History is

1. How has the pandemic affected your Unit/District?
2. What changes has your Unit/District made in meetings or activities to enable them to hold meetings and continue working our Auxiliary programs?
3. Have your members developed any new innovative ideas or activities that other Units/Districts might adapt to fit the needs of their Units/Districts? Please explain the idea/activity and how it helped serve our veterans, their families and our communities. What was the most successful new activity sponsored by the Unit/District?
4. Include the names of the eldest member in the Unit/District and the Unit/District member who has the longest tenure. (This is National President Nicole Clapp's project and should be included.)

Once more he asked the question, "Is this full?" "No," the class shouted. Once again he said, "Good."


Then he grabbed a pitcher of water and began to pour it in until the jar was filled to the brim. Then he looked at the class and asked, "What is the point of this illustration?"
