Each child is given a Bible and every day they learn a scripture, along with a coping skill. Every day there is an adventure that serves two purposes: fun and an opportunity to learn.

One of the lessons learned comes when each child is given a pile of sand which represents the layers of negativity heaped on them, ("You're no good." "You won't amount to anything." etc.) They must sift through the sand until they find the hidden jewel they are and they take that jewel home as a reminder.'

Some units used a form filling in blanks with numbers. That should be basic information for writing a narrative report. Please separate Poppy revenue by traditional poppies distributed and nontraditional Poppy items sold. Include pictures with descriptions, and anecdotes at distribution locations. With adequate information in our reports, we could qualify for National awards. (See information given to all District Presidents.) Please submit your Unit year-end reports to your District President by May 5 so she can compile a report and send to me by May 10. Reminder, in 2013 National expanded our principal fundraising opportunity, giving us permission to SELL nontraditional poppy items, as well as DISTRIBUTE FOR DO-NATIONS traditional crepe paper poppies. Also changed was Poppy funds may now be used for active military and their families under specific circumstances. Resolve to win back one member this year. Reinstatement is an easy process - just a personal contact with a delinquent member. Many members have dropped because of temporary situations that made attendance and commitment to the ALA difficult. Often there is not much we can do, but we can certainly keep in touch with these members and invite them back when their situation is resolved.

Resolve to become acquainted with delinquent members. Pay attention to their needs and concerns. Listen carefully to what they are saying. If
