Greetings from the Department of Missouri Membership Team! Just the word, Christmas, immediately brings to mind celebrating the birth of our Lord and Savior, Jesus, and numerous family traditions involving the tree, decorations, food, gifts, etc.

New Year's Day heralds a new beginning, a fresh start.

When you are a child, these holidays are vacations from school when time almost stands still so you can savor the essence of each one with family. If you are a child of a fallen or wounded warrior/first responder, the dynamic is not the same.

A parent is permanently missing in the picture, whether KIA or came home and later committed suicide. Perhaps the parent is present but not the same as before and the child must deal with the effects of PTSD,

TBI, (traumatic brain injury), and other wounds the parent suffers from. This is never easy, especially during the holidays.

That's why Kids Of Our Heroes Adventure Camp is so important. It's free to kids of fallen or wounded warriors/first responders. Therapeutic counseling and daily scrip-tures mix with adventures and kids learn to cope and heal. When you give to the camp, you are investing in the future of precious kids, a future of good memories, especially during holidays.

I have the task of promoting the County Government program in a time when few people have a favorable opinion of government. A recent Pew Research Center survey reported only 18 percent of Americans trust government. I have heard people say they were so discouraged by the news they were going to turn off TV and ignore the political process. I understand the sentiment but how does that help?

We are an organization that celebrates the men and women who serve to keep our country free. Isn't it our responsibility to be vigilant in watching the people who are making the policy that those heroes are protecting? Isn't it our responsibility to ensure future generations learn about government, patriotism and Americanism so they can continue the vigilance?

The 2018 Girls State Governor Camille Schoors in her speech at our convention last year shared a quote by Ronald Reagan, who said, "Freedom is never more than one generation from extinction."

Shali Larabee from Unit 315 was honored by National ALA as being an outstanding Junior leader. In an article in the August 2018 National Auxiliary magazine she was asked,

"Why is it important to engage our youngest members?" She responded, "With any good behavior or good influence, you have to start early in a person's life. The earlier you start, the more the youth are likely to grasp it and internalize it. It takes everybody — community members, school officials and parents - molding, teaching, guiding and modeling."

I believe that a County Government Day in your community is a good place to begin the task of encouraging our youth to learn about and gain respect for government.

Many units sponsor students to Girls State. The citizens study government on the state level and County Government Day is about government on the local level. Aren't the goals the same? Americanism is to promote patriotism and responsible citizenship. The focus is on three things that we

- 1. Be knowledgeable on flag history, etiquette and proper disposal methods; promote the observation of patriotic holidays so your community will look to the American Legion Auxiliary for information. Use social media to get information about the flag to those you share information with. Work with members of the schools and The American Legion to hold events such as flag folding and flag disposal ceremonies
- 2. Increase participation in the Americanism Essay Contest. Christie will tell you more about the essay.
- 3. Participate in the promotion of The American Legion Americanism programs. This may include working with the baseball program, oratorical contest, and junior shooting

You can provide programs to the local schools that do not take up much time but can get lots of information to the students. Suggestions for programs that you can incorporate into Patriot Day or Veterans Day would include: reading of the America's White Table, displaying and talking about the meaning of the POW/MIA table, history of Veterans Day and Memorial Day and the difference in the two, have a

disposal ceremony, story of Taps, Four Chaplains program, and have the different service flags and talk about each flag and then play the song with that branch of service. You can present a program about your local American Legion Post and Unit, telling the history of the local post and history of The American Legion family. You can have school staff and students bring pictures in and have a slide show presentation of veterans they know.

What is a Past Presidents Parley? It is a group of women who have been a Unit, District, Department or National President of the American Legion Auxiliary. They have accepted the responsibility to make a difference in mentoring other members to become good leaders and share information that will help them serve the organization, as well as the veterans, active military and their families. Many of the parleys meet at least once a year for fellowship and service throughout the organization and their community.

The Department has several ar-

eas that we concentrate on. First: Unit Member of the Year. We ask Units to nominate a Unit Member of the Year who has not served the Unit above Unit President. The Unit Member chosen will be honored at the Department Convention and the National Convention if she attends. Rules and deadline dates are included in the packet that has been placed in each District Information Bag. Please, please share this information with the Units in your

The Second area is recognizing the military service of active duty women in all branches. Guidelines for nominating a woman serving in the military may also be found in the District packet. The woman chosen at the Department level will be forwarded to National and will be honored at the National Convention if chosen on the National level.

A third area is the Nurses Scholarship. This scholarship will assist a deserving student pursuing an education in the nursing field. Our Department will choose one young person who will receive a scholarship of \$500. Information as to how to apply is also included in the packet previously mentioned. All of this information will also be in the Legionette. Please share this information with your Units and encourage them to participate. I hope we have winners in all three categories this year.

An annual report is not required; however, I have created a Report Form to be sent to me for accuracy when I report to National. Additionally, National is requesting an annual summary and a mid-year progress report as tools to gauge the direction and effectiveness of this Department activity. #### Unit Member of the Year Award

The Unit Member of the Year award recognizes women serving at the unit level who exemplify the values and ideals of the Auxiliary and whose accomplishments significantly impact the program work in their units.

#### Criteria & Selection Process

Nominees must be an adult American Legion Auxiliary unit member not

in an elected or appointed leadership role higher than unit president. A narrative of 1,000 words or less describing the nominee's accomplishments and activities must be submitted by a unit to department Past Presidents Parley chairman Rosemarie W. Hauck.

Each department selects one Unit Member of the Year from its submitted

The selection of the winner is at the discretion of the department Past Presidents Parley chairman.

Recognition of the winners occurs at the American Legion Auxiliary's national convention.

**NOTE:** If the winner attends the National Convention, she is responsible for her own transportation and lodging. She will attend the National Past Presidents Luncheon at the expense of the Unit.

I have outlined 13 different facts about leadership. These are only suggestions and ideas. Share your knowledge of the ALA with new members joining and also to long time members. A prosperous unit is open to new ideas and is willing to allow these ideas into the unit. Leadership is not a position or title...it is action and example. All the information that I have gathered is put into a binder. Included in this binder is the Program Action Plan for this year. A few important ideas included are the Preamble and its meaning, the Auxiliary emblem and its meaning, and how to conduct a meeting. Yes, these are basics. Also included in the binder is the test for the Leadership workshop. You are encouraged to take the Leadership course. There are some blank pages for you to gather more information and keep for future reference. Let's teach and show what we know and be the leader who sets an example for all fellow members to follow.

As the year progresses I will share with the districts any information received from National Chairman.

Year-end reports are due to me by April 15, 2019. I urge all districts to send me a report. Please send your best unit report. I will mail a leadership report form to all districts by January 15, 2019. This allows plenty of time to complete the form. All districts and units need to submit a narrative with this form. Awards will be presented at convention for best district report and best unit report for leadership. Please remember that reporting is very important.

LEADERSHIP FACTS

- Get to know the members of your unit. Ask them about their skills and interests.
- Match the members with some of the projects that your Auxiliary unit participates in. Not all leaders have titles.
- 3. Explain at your meetings through your chairmen on what our programs are about and what the unit does for each of these programs.
- Make Unit Guides available to all new members.
- Provide the ALA pin to new members
- 6. Explain to members how to conduct a meeting.
- To maintain new members, make your meetings fun and interesting. Involve new members. It can be something they can do behind the scenes if they don't want to take charge of an activity. Getting members involved helps to maintain these members, especially if they know the meaning and purpose of what they are doing and why they
- are doing it. Read and explain your constitution and bylaws at least once a year. Explaining the different parts of your constitution and bylaws
- makes for better understanding. 9. Involve your new members along with members who have been around for awhile. You will probably be surprised how little a 5-year, 10year or 20-year member does not know about the Auxiliary.
- 10. Take charge and explain every aspect of the American Legion Auxiliary.
- 11. Members will only know what they are shown or taught. Let members old and new have hands on with any or all projects.
- 12. Use positive and experienced members to train and guide mem-
- 13. Always remember, your way is not always the best way. New ideas and inspiration can come from old or new members. You just need to listen to what these members are saying. Being a good listener is what makes you a good leader.

evident. The 2013-2014 rule changes also encouraged using non-traditional poppy items for successful fundraising. We DISTRIBUTE traditional crepe paper poppies. We SELL nontraditional poppy items.

The Poppy Program Guide was revised 7/20/18, with a new section on non-traditional poppy items and questions and answers about use of funds. A book is available from Emblem Sales (\$1.95) or downloadable (FREE) from alaforveterans.org. This is a "must-have" for all units! Useful quotes from the Guide:

- "Updated rules offer new ways to increase donations. We now have greater flexibility to use the symbolic red poppy in many ways, shapes and forms to raise money to support veterans, military, and their families. We're no longer limited to using crepe paper poppies.
- "Put ALA POPPIES in the public eye all year. the places you go on a daily or weekly basis are great prospective poppy promotion sites. Public interest in helping veterans is high, and National Headquarters receives many calls from business-es wanting to "buy" poppies. Your bank, grocery store, post office, and nail salon are great spots to offer poppy items to show your support for veterans and military."

Since mid-year reports are due oon. I suggest that units compile a poppy report of anything not submitted from last year before we forget the information, especially poppies distributed on Memorial Day. Please send it to me. (See WANT AD in this newspaper.)

St. Charles Unit 312, District 9 had a good example of a comprehensive report. 4 stated how many poppies were purchased, how much money was collected, the number of volunteers donating their time, the dates, times and places where

they were distributed. They also explained how the fund is used. The Poppy chairman made a felt poppy for each volunteer to wear. They also gave a Poppy to the fifth- grade class for their studies on World War I. They participated in the Poppy Poster Contest which were sent to the Department level. The 78th session of American Legion Auxiliary Missouri Girls State will be held on the campus of the University of Central Missouri in Warrensburg Sunday, June 23, 2019, through Saturday June 29, 2019. As a reminder, ALA MGS committee will continue not distributing or mailing Unit Packets this year. A copy of the packet will be emailed to all District Presidents and District Girls State Chairs on November 1. All units can also access this packet on our website www.missourigirlsstate.org . We are following the same online application process that we have utilized the previous three sessions thanks to some amazing assistance from staff members of the American Legion Boys State program. In case you aren't familiar, a female junior who wishes to attend ALA Missouri Girls State will need to enter her information by completing our online application process. Then she will print her completed application, sign it, and return it to the ALA unit or school. The deadline will once again be March 1, 2019, and the fee will remain \$300 per delegate.

The ALA MGS committee has worked over the years to continue streamlining efforts associated with planning the program and all of the informational efforts each year prior to the session. We will continue with each of our schools of instruction offered to the citizens that provides them the opportunity to receive dual credit eligibility through the University of Central Missouri. The Children & Youth program emphasizes protecting, caring for and supporting children and youth, particularly those of veterans and military families. ALA members fulfill our brand promise of being community leaders and responsible American citizens while caring for military families. In doing so, we are building a future membership based among our military families.

Work together to find ways to support these children and their families. Develop relationships between Legion Family members and military children, and families and children of the veterans. Contact local schools to access their need for supplies and extra clothes for the homeless children. Offer to supply items as needed. Help raise awareness for the needs of homeless children in your community by sharing unit activities on your Unit website, social media pages and newsletters.

Suicide and depression have become real problems among military children. Military children whose parents are deployed are using mental health services at a rate three and a half times greater than their civilian counterparts. "Adopt" children of the military families. There is available a publication from National Emblem Sales called "Bridging • the Gap." It is a booklet on preventing and stopping bullying. The cost is 59 cents each for the purchase of 100 or more and the order number • is #755.305. It would be a good source to share in your schools. Bullying • is happening all too often in our schools these days.

April is Children and Youth Month. As Americans, we need to remember amid the problems we face daily with the environment, crime, unemployment and financial uncertainty, the one constant which will . make or break this nation is our young people. During this time the American Legion Family emphasizes its commitment to our nation's • children. Child safety is an ever increasing problem with the internet and cellphone use. Child pornography, drugs and drug abuse, alcohol • abuse prevention, child, sexual abuse and neglect, and teenage suicide • prevention are hot topics. Under Family Preservation, National Family • Week activities help keep the families involved with each other. Day Care Safety, Foster Care and Missing Children are all programs that • can be included in your Unit's work.

A special program that helps give birthday parties for children in need is promoted at some of the food banks and Units. Most everything • that would be needed is put in a grocery bag or a large gift bag. It includes a cake mix, frosting, cups, plates, napkins, forks, party favors, candles, and anything else that would suit a young person. The cost of • the bag is approximately \$20. The bags include a label which states the gender and the age appropriate for the contents. This program is much appreciated in their community.

National is promoting The American Legion Auxiliary Youth Hero • and Good Deed Award. Youth under 18 years of age who have performed specific good deeds are great examples of community service in • action. The youth is not required to be a part of an American Legion Family. #### **Poppy Poster Contest Guidelines**

Units should sponsor contests in local schools. When schools do not conduct activities, other youth groups, including Junior members, may participate under direct supervision of the unit.

- Class I: Grades 2 and 3 Class II: Grades 4 and 5
- Class III: Grades 6 and 7
- Class IV: Grades 8 and 9
- Class V: Grades 10 and 11
- Class VI: Grade 12
- Class VII: Students with spe-
- cial needs Those in special education
- classes ii. A student recommended for special education classes but who has not been admitted due to a waiting list or various other factors.

iii. A child identified as having a disability, but not in a special education class due to lack of facilities. Identification contingent upon discretion of school officials.

#### **Poppy Poster Requirements**

- 1. Each poster shall have a fitting slogan not to exceed 10 words. Articles - "a", "and", "an" are not to be counted as words. The words "buddy" and "buy" cannot be used.
- 2. The words "American Legion Auxiliary" must be used in the design of the poster and will not be counted in the 10-word count.
- 3. Each poster must include a picture of the red Flanders Field poppy.
- 4. Department will determine the closing date for the unit contest. The poster shall be on 11 x 14 poster board. Drawing paper will not be ac-
- 5. The United States flag may be used as long as there is no infractions of the flag code.
- 6. Posters will be judged using the following criteria: 50 percent poster appeal (layout, message, originality); 40 percent - artistic ability (design and color); 10 percent - neat-
- 7. Media used shall be watercolors, crayons, powder or oil paint, handmade paper cutouts, ink or textures, acrylics, pencils and markers.
- 8. Written in ink on the back of the poster (not attached) shall be the class in which the entry is submitted, the name, address, age and grade of the contestant and the name of the department (Department of Missouri.)
- 9. Submissions become property of the American Legion Auxiliary. Through submission of artwork, contestants and their legal guardians grant non-exclusive reproduction and publication rights to the works submitted and agree to have their names and artwork published for commercial use without additional compensation or permission.
- The poster shall be the work of only one person.
- The label "In Memoriam" from the veteran-made poppy may not be used.

What is a Resolution

Resolutions are a formal way of stating intended action by a group of people. A resolution is an original motion, which because of its importance, length, or complexity is submitted in writing. It is then brought forward on the floor of a local unit general membership meeting, state convention, or national convention for wider adoption

Writing a Resolution Resolutions are your opportunity to address problems, situations, or concerns which

affect children and youth and which require local action for solutions. Resolutions are an important part of advocacy efforts as well as program development. Identify your issue – keep it simple

Ensure the issue has not been addressed at the local, state or national level

- Research your issue Whereas should support the resolved statements
- Make sure the research clearly supports the statements and statistics used to support the resolve.
- Relates to Unit, District or Department's areas of concern and is in harmony with the Objects and basic policies, but does not cite these Objects or policies in the whereas clauses
- Background references are factual and verifiable, published no more than six

Beginning your Resolution

WHEREAS .....( The whereas is the first half of the resolution. It explains WHY the action in the resolved clauses should be taken. It states past action, reasons for the action and your reasons

The first word, of the whereas clause sets the "tone" for the statement, the stronger the conviction about an issue, the stronger the first word.

Each clause in the whereas should be followed by a comma (,) and the word "and." The last clause in this section of the resolution should be followed by a colon (:) Keep to 1 1/2 pages maximum Footnotes: Keep it simple.)

RESOLVED. (The resolved clauses of a resolution tell the reader what ACTION which should be taken to solve the problem set up in the whereas. The resolved clauses should be the strongest part of your resolution. The first word of the resolved clause should be a verb, and should show what will follow in the clause. Each operative clause should end with a semi-colon (;). The last resolved clause should be followed by a period (.)

#### GUIDELINE FOR WRITING UNIT STANDING RULES

Standing Rules are rules and regulations, which are related to the details of the administration of a society for the guidance of an assembly, which have been adopted, the same as ordinary resolutions, by a majority vote without previous notice

## Auxiliary **Emergency Fund**

The Auxiliary Emergency Fund is a way of providing temporary financial assistance to eligible members when times of financial crisis or weather-related emergencies and natural disasters have taken a toll on homes and livelihoods. Members must have paid their membership dues for the immediate  $% \left( 1\right) =\left( 1\right) \left( 1\right) \left($ past two consecutive years. Their current dues must be paid at the time of the emergency. Those members are eligible to apply for assistance.

The maximum grant amount is \$2,400, disbursed from the Auxiliary

Emergency Fund Grant Committee.

Types of temporary assistance available include assistance during a time of financial crisis when no other source of aid is readily available to pay for shelter, food and utilities; for food and shelter due to weather-related emergencies and natural disasters; and for educational training for members who have a lack of skills necessary for employment or to upgrade competitive workforce skills.

You may want to have printed applications and AEF brochures available for unit meetings and at the post. A donation container can be placed at the post home. You can order a free downloadable can label from www.ALAforveterans.org. If you would like to make a personal donation to AEF, a \$50 donation or larger will earn you a pin requested by Department from National Headquarters.

There is a Citation Plaque Recognition for one unit and one department contributing the largest donations to AEF by June 1, 2019.

There are several fun ways to raise money. One suggestion is a Water Bottle Coin Collection asking each member to fill a 20-ounce bottle with coins by a designated date. A 20-ounce bottle filled with dimes adds to almost \$100.

Anyone unfamiliar with the ALA could quickly learn of the organization's goals, its composition and its operation by examining the Constitution, Bylaws and Standing Rules.

- The **Constitution** contains a description of the organization: its name, nature, purpose and struc-
- The Bylaws comprise the operational procedures of the American Legion Auxiliary.
- The **Standing Rules** list specific rules governing its operation, for conducting responsibilities of committees and chairmen.

The Constitution and Bylaws program informs and educates members of the American Legion Auxiliary on the importance and power of properly written, reviewed and updated documents, policies and procedures at all levels. Preparing and adhering to updated Constitution, Bylaws and Standing Rules will ensure a more successful organizational process and provide the structures to follow at all levels of our organization. Constitution and Bylaws can be a dry subject if you permit it to be, but by expending a little effort, it can be made very interesting.

Units are advised to review their Constitution and Bylaws, as well as those of their District, and the Department and National organization to ensure conformity and increase familiarity.

All members are urged to memorize the Preamble to the Constitution that expresses in beautiful language the basic reasons for our existence as the largest patriotic organization of women in the world. At each Unit meeting, every District meeting, Fall Conference and Department Convention the Preamble of the American Legion Auxiliary Constitution is recited in unison. What is important about the Preamble is that we understand what and why we are saying or reading it.

A year-end report is due to us by May 1, 2019. We would like to have all districts send us your Best Unit narrative and a narrative from the District Chairman. Awards will be presented. More information was given to each District President. The cover page provides the contact information and specific details about awards.

### Women **Veterans**

National President Kathy Dugan's focus is the veteran homelessness, particularly women veterans. "What can the American Legion Auxiliary's education program do to concentrate in those efforts?

What is homelessness? It is not having a home or not having a permanent home or address. Some are going from someone else's home to another. I call it couch hopping or living in a tent city or out in the open areas.

In a 2017 Annual Homeless Assessment Report to Congress, the U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development (HUD) estimated over 40.000 veterans were homeless on a single night in January of that year. Of those, about 9 percent were women. From 2016 to 2017 the number of homeless female veterans increased by 7 percent, compared with 1 percent for their male counterparts. According to VA's National Center for PTSD data from VA's military sexual trauma screening program show that about 1 in 4 women and 1 in 100 men respond "yes" that they experienced sexual trauma or assault while in the military. Currently in Missouri there are over 44.894 countable women veterans. It is estimated that 30-40 percent have not applied for veterans benefits. It is not known how many are homeless.

Homeless women veterans do not fit the stereotype of your normal homeless person living on the streets. Female homeless veterans often have children and tend to temporarily stay with family or friends. They are afraid of admitting they are homeless for fear of losing their children.

Just as homeless male veterans often don't seek help because they were instilled with a sense of selfreliance and pride while in the military. Female homeless veterans are also often caregivers for their children and have a very hard time asking for help.

Today's female veterans have experienced not only the horrors of war but also trauma of being sexually assaulted and raped. While female veterans are self-reliant they are also scared to death of reporting the assaults because of death threats made to them and their family. Often to forget these horrors they turn to alcohol and drugs.

We as Auxiliary units working with the Legion Family and our districts can reach some of these homeless female and male veterans. Hopefully we can help them become self-reliant again. Contact other community services for help in identifving these veterans. Make goody gift bags with items they can use also with cards of encouragement and helpful information. Together we can make a difference.
