Education

Efforts to support the ALA Education programs are actively at work in Missouri. Units throughout the Department have unique and varied ways of partnering with the schools in their communities. Several units reported supporting American Education Week, with some providing apples for teachers and school staff members in their communities. Another unit took donuts to school; and one reported they had worked with local churches to help fill gift bags for teachers, bus drivers, custodians, and nurses

Give 10 to Education was also supported in several ways. Units purchased items to donate to teachers for classroom use; others held school supply drives, and included donations funded by the units as well. Items donated included paper, notebooks, pencils, and crayons. Units reported donations of \$175 for school supplies, and \$45 cash donations from individuals for the ALA members to do the shopping for them.

Several units reported participating in Veterans in Community Schools programs, especially around Veterans Day. Unit 57 junior members assisted with a Veterans Day Program. They also had a veteran visit school. A retired teacher also shared information about Veterans

Day. One veteran shared his Army experience during Vietnam and brought medals to show the students. Another veteran sent his medals

and uniform to be shown, and one shared information about his tour of duty in Afghanistan.

Some schools invited veterans to their assemblies. Other units recognized veterans with thank-you letters written by elementary students

One unit assisted with the presentation of "The Fallen Soldier" and "Chapel of Four Chaplains" at the local school. A unit president presented the POW/MIA table setting at the annual Veterans Day Program at their local school.


Units are working hard spreading the word about available scholarships. This chairman presented scholarship information at Fall Conference. The new ALA Junior Member Loyalty Scholarship was introduced. Handouts were given to the District Presidents to be distributed to their members concerning various scholarships.

Several units reported already distributing scholarship information directly to the schools. One unit published an article in their Post/Unit newsletter promoting scholarships. The article included application links, summary of eligibility criteria and monetary amount.

- Some units award their own scholarships. A value of \$2,200 was midyear report with another \$200 donation to the American Legion Legacy Scholarship Fund.
- Several units reported collecting Box Tops for Education, Campbell Soup labels, other product labels, old cartridges, cellphones and keys that provide benefit to local schools.
- A unit contributed \$600 to pay the lunch bills for needy families and
- donated \$300 to the Backpack Program . Contributions were made to other organizations that help students

such as \$500 to Dolly Parton's Children's Books Program and \$75 to Say No to Drugs.

We hope you continue your participation in the Education program with much more for the end of year report.

Most certainly honor our veterans and the military currently deployed serving in all corners of the world.

Our forefathers established our pattern for freedom through hardships and struggles. They formed our way of life. Each generation safeguards our freedom, so that we may live in democracy. It is each citizen's responsibility to uphold and defend these principles of justice, freedom and democracy.

With this responsibility we have an obligation to protect our country because we enjoy our freedom. It takes effort to preserve our democracy because freedom isn't free. Since we are members of this great patriotic Ameri-can Legion Auxiliary and dedicated to *spread the word*, we need to reflect on ways to participate in the Americanism program.

Šince Americanism is a part of our daily life, let's reflect on monthly topics to see how we can accomplish our important and vital task — *spreading the* word

January - We hear many political speeches about elections and hear debates. We need to listen, form opinions and resolve to strengthen our focus on being a patriotic citizen. Listen to the candidate's promises and decide what can be a reality after election.

- Has been famous for two popular presidents, Lincoln and *February* Washington. Let these two become an example for our participation in the Americanism program. Valentine's Day reminds us to do our service to the veterans in a loving way and with kindness. This is a good time to get the junior members involved.

March — Remember the military personnel who are deployed in all corners of the world. Many families are deserving of the Blue Star Banner to indicate a family member is serving our country. The *pocket flag project* is near and dear to our servicement and -women. It is a small symbol to carry next to their hearts showing that we appreciate their service to our country. *April* — This month the focus is Children & Youth activities. This pro-

vides the opportunity to provide extra instruction on the proper procedure for the Pledge of Allegiance and national anthem. You should stand at attention, nothing in your hands and hand over your heart. For some reason this seems too difficult for many. You accept this challenge and continue to instruct this procedure when you can. County government provides first-hand involvement in government and greet the county officials. Encourage the instructor to hold a mock election for the positions and write an essay why they want to participate and what do they hope to obtain from the experience.

May — Poppies are generally distributed during this month. Explain the significance of the little red paper flower. Educate the youth about veterans and how thankful we are because they served our country. Collect flags and have an Avenue of Flags. This is an awesome sight to be displayed on certain holidays. Don't forget Memorial Day. This holiday honors those who made the ultimate sacrifice for our country so that we may continue to live in freedom. Encourage schools to have assemblies honoring veterans. They can share their experiences. Perhaps your community can celebrate this holiday with a parade or other activities that are suitable for your community.

June — Attending local summer sports events provides an excellent opportunity to show proper respect to our flag. While you are watching your grandchildren or neighbors play at a game, do what you can to instill a patriotic atmosphere. Flag Day is another day for emphasis. Do you participate in the Girls State/Boys State program? This is another opportunity to learn about government by participation.

July — July 4th is the significant holiday, Independence Day. Our forefathers struggled to gain our independence and draft the Constitution. I doubt they wanted any part of our democracy abused or changed. It is up to you to help preserve our ideals.

August — Perhaps you can find a way to promote scouting. Many of the youth will be going to campouts during the summer. You can be a positive influence on their patriotic attitude. The Scouts can work on patriotic badges. They can collect old worn flags and have a flag burning ceremony. Invite a troop to your meeting or sponsor a troop. **September** — You can check the schools and make sure each classroom

has an American flag. It is never too late to encourage participation in the Oratorical contest. This program takes long-range planning and preparation October — Education is the program to focus on this month. The Na-

tional Program Plan gives several suggestions for participation. You can be creative. Promote the Americanism Essay Contest that is self-expression on a patriotic topic. Purchase comic books that are a pictorial version of Ameri-

Leaders Create A Good Image

An image is a mental picture that is formed about someone which may be based on the memory of an experience. It may be constructed from impressions that hold little resemblance to the actual person. We must learn to like ourselves better and be more accepting in order to improve our image.

First Impressions: You never get a second chance to make a first impression! The first impression people form of you is the one that will stay in their minds. Research indicates that we start to make up our minds about other people within seven seconds of meeting them. Make sure you are projecting the image you want people to remember.

Meeting People: Don't wait too long before greeting and introducing yourself. If you don't understand their name, ask the person to repeat it. Look directly at the person while the name is being spoken. Try to put the name and face together. Associate the name with the same name of a familiar person.

Repeat the name after hearing it. **Personal Appearance:** You do not need perfect features or a perfect body to make yourself attractive. Making correct choices of clothing, along with your attitude and actions help make the most of natural looks. Looking good makes us feel good and gives us confidence. Image includes things that detract as well as enhance such as messy hair, dirty fingernails, clothing that doesn't fit, heavy makeup, or scuffed shoes.

Body Language: Sit up straight with body resting lightly against the chair. Keep both feet flat on the floor or cross your feet at the ankles. Rest your hands in your lap or on the chair arm. Look relaxed and in command. Your body language should show interest, confidence, enthusiasm, and respect. Posture, gestures, facial expressions, eye contact, and how you walk are a

reflection of a person's féelings. **Telephone Etiquette:** Your first impression may be over the telephone.

An image is formed from the tone of your voice, the words spoken and the attitude conveyed. They will judge your friendliness, helpfulness and effectiveness by your telephone attitude.

Letter Writing: When writing letters use the correct format and proper grammar. If you use your best qualities, others will want to be with you and anxious to cooperate. Think about the talents you have to share. Your good qualities such at physical appearance, energy, pitch and voice tone, gestures, eye expression and ability to hold the interest of others are an advantage for you. Be yourself and consistently be at your best! The effective people never change character from one situation to another. They communicate with their whole being. You have the magic to make a good impression WITHIN yourself, because no one can be you as WELL as you can. (Taken from the 1996-1997 National

November — This is the time we hear about elections and voting. It is essential for us to exercise the right to vote as established by our forefathers. Explain the significance and importance of Veterans Day to everyone. This is a good time for schools to have a patriotic program honoring veterans. You can help organize the program.

December — As you cruise around your community admiring the beautiful Christmas decorations, check to see if you find some worn-torn flags flying at businesses. Find the manager and remind him/her of the torn flag. As a unit project you can purchase new flags. In larger communities you can participate in the Citizenship program where we have people who want to become an American citizen.

These are merely suggestions that you might try. Please approach your contacts politely and be prepared to explain the purpose of your visit. If you already participate in some of these activities, expand your participation and function with renewed enthusiasm. Encourage new members to participate. Ask for suggestions on how to improve your activities. Hopefully your long-time members will be ready and eager to help. Combine the new and old ideas because our patriotic work is never finished

We should be alert to the dangers to our freedom in our country. Patriotism is taking responsibility seriously by being informed and helping educate others. Make it catching like a virus.

We are compassionate people. Don't you feel thrilled when you hear our national anthem or any patriotic song? "America the Beautiful" gives me a picture of all the blessings we have inherited. It is thrilling to see the United States flag raised and lowered as citizens are showing respect the proper way. We need to educate Americans on this concept. Our freedom so often is taken for granted. It seems so few want to do more to keep alive the spirit of democracy. Encourage students to be familiar with the national monuments in Washington, D.C. Suggest this as a family vacation. The awesome monuments make history come to life. The changing of the Guard at the National Cemetery at the Tomb of the Unknown shows us how important all the military personnel are. They gave their lives while serving our country. The vigilance is continuous.

Being an American Legion Auxiliary member shows we are proud to be an American. Let's stand up and be counted.

FLAG ETTIQUETE

FLAG RAISING: All citizens salute from the moment the flag begins to ascend the flag pole and hold the salute until the flag reaches the top.

FLAG RETREAT: The salute begins when the flag begins its descent on the pole until the flag is unhooked from the rope. Stand at attention facing the flag until it has been folded and the guard retreated.

SALUTE TO THE FLAG: During the ceremony of hoisting or lowering the flag or when the flag is passing in a parade or in a review, all persons present should face the flag, stand at attention and salute with no articles in their hands. When singing the national anthem, stand at attention facing the flag with the right hand over the heart. Do not salute when singing any patriotic song other than the national anthem.
