Imagine you are a child of a wounded or fallen soldier, you are at KOOH-AC and it's Day 4. Today's Theme: Hope and Peace; the skill: Relaxation and Reframing; the adventure: Talking Rocks Cavern. The cave guide leads you deeply into the cave and turns off all the lights for a minute. You are in total darkness. The cave is cold and everyone is quiet. All you hear is the faint dripping of water. The darkness is to remind you how it was for the original explorers. That minute of darkness seems like an eternity. You feel fear, being trapped and lost, and hopeless. Then the light is turned on and reveals a beautiful natural cave structure that formed over hundreds of years at the end of the cave. It looks like a 30-foot-tall angel with head bowed. You feel so grateful for the light and the image. Later at the camp the adventure is discussed. Life has often left you in a dark place of despair, loneliness, hurt, consequences from bad choices, fear and anxiety. But you are reminded that Jesus is the one guiding light to get you through the trouble and dark times. Choosing Him to be your guiding light will help you choose the right path morally to navigate life. The counselors teach about relaxation and reframing, how to take challenges and heartbreaking experiences and find the silver You remember the cave being cold, but on the bright side it had nature's air conditioning on a very hot day. Scriptures are read.

National Security



OFFICIAL CALL FOR THE ANNUAL CONVENTION AMERICAN LEGION AUXILIARY, DEPARTMENT OF MISSOURI

The 99th Department Convention of the American Legion Auxiliary is hereby called to order to convene at the Marriott St. Louis Airport in St. Louis, Missouri, on July 11-14, 2019, in conformity with Article VI, Section 1, of the Constitution and Bylaws of the American Legion Auxiliary which provides, "The Legislative body of the American Legion Auxiliary shall be the Department Convention to be held annually at the same time and place of the American Legion.

PURPOSE: "The Convention is called for the election of Department Officers for the ensuing year; receiving reports of the Department Officers, Executive Committee and the Chairmen of all standing committees; electing delegates and alternates to National Convention; and the transaction of such other business as may be brought before

REPRESENTATION: "Section 2. This Department Convention shall be composed of delegates and alternates from each Unit. Each Unit shall be entitled to one delegate and one alternate for the first ten members and one delegate and one alternate for each additional twenty-five members or major fraction thereof paid to the Department thirty days prior to the date of the Convention." Delegate strength shall be based on Unit membership into Department Office by close of books, June 15th. Delegates and or alternates have voting power of all questions brought before the Convention. Alternates may vote only in the absence of the delegates. There is no proxy vote.

Children and Youth 2018-2019 **Department of** Missouri

Units in Missouri were busy helping the children and youth of their communities.

Monies were given for Project Graduation including veterans' children, floats in parades where candy was distributed, Christmas parties, Easter egg hunts, trick or treat bags, Halloween safety booklets at schools, Special Olympics, Camp Quality which is a camp for children with cancer, summer Bible School, donated to school backpack programs, helped with the local band programs in the school, supporting baseball teams, Girl Scout Troops, a boy's home, gloves for a day care, making blankets for Project Linus, donating auction baskets for fundraising at Camp Barnabas which is a summer camp for special needs children, Hunter Education Classes, St. Jude's Children's Hospital, Children's Miracle Network, food pantries, teddy bears for Cystic Fibrosis and various other functions filled out the programs.

Pull tabs from aluminum cans were collected for a total of 3,359 pounds for Ronald McDonald House totaling over \$3,000.

Hours for "Shop With a Cop," Special Olympics and Holiday Express were donated. On Military Kids Day, one Unit made cupcakes for all students K-6. One hundred sixty were military kids of the two hundred twenty served. Small flags were also given to the military kids.

One Unit has a special section in their post where bags are collected for birthday party bags. They are labeled for a boy or girl and age level. In these bags are things for a child's birthday party including cake mix, frosting, candles, party supplies like hats, treats for the guests and a small gift for the child. These are for children who otherwise would not get to have a special party and cost about \$20 to assemble. Stuffed animals either new or slightly used, which had to be washed and bagged, were given to the local Fire and Police Departments.

Hours reported spent on the C & Y program are 15,851 with 10,945 children served. Auxiliary members serving were 597 with 31 junior members assisting.

Money spent on C & Y is \$119,270. Some of the money spent went for scholarships for wounded warriors and other children and grandchildren of Legion and Auxiliary members. One hundred and twenty hero packs were put together and distrib-

The Good Deed Award and the Heroic Act of Valor Award was given to one Child this year. It was reported that he recently earned his Eagle Scout Award by helping a Homeless Shelter. He secured labor and generous donations for materials needed to repair and replace the floor in the common room of the Community Resource Center in Chilicothe. Sometimes, if full, veterans end up sleeping on that floor. The Center's mission is to provide shelter and assist with education and work force needs. This was a great act of kindness that this young man did.

Poppy Report

Reports were received from 34 units, eight districts and individual reports from seven units. Several mentioned the age of members prohibited distribution activities.

Units involved all members of the American Legion Family. The Legionnaires and Legion Riders made an impression with their presence at distribution events. One Junior member asked her classmates to make cards for soldiers. She taped a poppy to each of the 386 cards and sent them to Walter Reed Hospital, Washington, D.C. Another asked her third-grade classmates to make placemats for a veterans breakfast and included a poppy. Another Junior member donated her portion of a family garage sale to the poppy Fund. Juniors made posters for unit distribution events and gave copies of The Poppy Story and the poem "In Flanders Field" among audiences before patriotic ceremonies.

One unit completed a year long Poppy Drive beginning in August with installation of officers, regular poppy distribution, and continuous availability of poppies at the Post. Their major emphasis was the 100th anniversary of the WWI Armistice November 11, 1918. They made a poster which people could place remembrance cards with a name and a sentiment — FOR GOD AND COUNTRY, IN MEMORY OF, HONORING THEIR SERVICE.

A unit chair reported that reading "In Flanders Field" was more meaningful since being involved in the Poppy Program. Another chair reported that for her Unit's Spring luncheon she made a felt poppy corsage pin for the 90 attendees with a poem:

I'll wear this little poppy
As red as red can be
To show that I remember
Those who fought and died for me.
In addition to the corsages

units made wall decorations, table

centerpieces, distributed poppies at nursing homes and unit recruiting events. One unit made a poster WE HEART OUR VETERANS with the heart filled with 100 poppies. One unit decided to become poppy makers.

Units kept the Poppy program awareness in a variety of ways such as keeping a basket of poppies on the bar at the post available for anyone wishing to donate. Poppy cans were placed at local merchants and checked weekly. Poppy programs were held in churches, schools, Boy Scout meetings, civic organizations, WWII re-enactments, and JROTC groups. Many of these groups helped in distribution events..

Several units reported they had to be creative in finding new locations for distribution because large chain stores don't allow solicitation without proof of insurance. They were able to be at department stores, sporting goods stores, shopping centers, town squares, local food and convenience stores and restaurants. Several units were able to have booths at community garage sales and craft shows.

A few units stated their goals were increasing awareness of the Poppy Program, increasing their poppy order and additional poppy dates, and changing locations. Units with new Junior members plan to revive the Miss Poppy and Post contests. Other units are researching projects to involve SAL youth and the Junior members.

Several units have used my slogan EVERY DAY IS POPPY DAY to promote their program. A few units have expanded their distribution to multiple days — National Poppy Day, entire Memorial Day weekend, Veterans Day, Armed Forces Day, and Independence Day. Units developed year-round schedules in 2-hour shifts.

Carefully compile your Poppy report and read it at the Unit meeting as part of the minutes to be used in planning the next year's activity.



During this centennial year Irene Steele, a member of Unit 34, District 2, will be recognized for her 73 years of membership in the American Legion Auxiliary. For many years veterans and active duty military have been honored by the Steele family. Each year Irene sent Christmas gifts, mailed Christmas cards, contributed to veterans homes, distributed Poppies and supported Girls State. She also placed a wreath at the Memorial Day services to remember our departed servicemen and -women. Irene is an inspiration to the community for her $commitment\ to\ the\ American$ Legion Auxiliary.



PARLIAMENTARY PROCEDURE NOTES

Quorum — The minimum number of members that must be present for business to be conducted legally. The actual number is usually stated in the bylaws. Present motion — make a proposal. Second a motion — support of the motion. Discussion of motion — give opinions on the motion. Vote on motion — make a decision.

How do I present a motion?

Obtain the floor — Wait until the last speaker is finished. and address the chair. Say Madam Chairman or Madam President. Give your name. The chair Give your name. recognizes you. Make your motion

— Speak clearly and concisely.
State your motion affirmatively. Say "I move that we...". Above all, avoid personalities and stay on the subject. Wait for a second another member will say "I second the motion" or the chair will call for a second. If there is no second your motion will not be considered. The chair will state your motion — the chair must say, "It is moved and seconded that we...". After this happens, discussion and voting can occur. Expand on your motion mover is allowed to speak first. Direct all comments to the chair. Keep a time limit for speaking. You may speak again after all others have finished. You may speak a third time by a motion to suspend the rules with two-thirds vote. Putting the question — The chair asks, "Are you ready for the question?" If there is no discussion, a vote is taken. The chair announces the result.

Two-thirds vote — At least twothirds of the votes cast by persons who are legally entitled to vote, excluding blanks or abstentions, at a regular or properly called meeting at which a quorum is present. Majority vote — More than half of the votes cast by persons who are legally entitled to vote, excluding blanks or abstentions, at a regular or properly called meeting at which a quorum is present.
